
Studying Arabic in the Heart of North Africa

› HIGH ARABIC

GUARANTEED SUCCESS for Beginners or Experts

We at arabandu are proud to offer you certified courses to achieve five language levels in general Arabic, from the absolute beginner level A1 to the advanced level C1. Whether you are a beginner, intermediate, or expert, we can still teach you a thing or two. You pass consecutively from level to level, until you achieved your desired proficiency and joined a club of 420 million Arabic speakers worldwide. You can vary the course intensity in three ways:

1 Standard / Taking it Slow and Thorough

With the standard course the progress of one language level will take 15 hours of class per week for a total duration of 8 weeks per level. If you want plenty of time to explore Tunisia during your stay, digest your learnings, and not have your language classes take over your schedule, this course is what you are looking for.

2 Semi-intensive / The Middle Road

The semi-intensive course will mean about 19 hours of class per week for 7 weeks per level. This course is a good mix of intensity and free time for you if you have no wish to take it slower or faster.

3 Intensive / If You Have no Time to Lose

The intensive course is our masterpiece. Combining high intensity with thorough and precise learning, our teachers really do give their best to make you an Arabic expert in as little time as possible. You will have 22 hours of class per week for a total duration of around 6 weeks per level – meaning that you can achieve advanced B2 from A1 in less than half a year. If your business, academia, or desire to jump into meaningful Arabic conversations is waiting, this is the right course for you.

CARE FOR VARIETY?

In Tunisia, most locals speak the Tunisian dialect which combines Arabic, French, and Berber influences. If you would like to have some informal, relaxed Tunisian classes besides your Arabic course we arrange for that. These classes can take place in a café or some other venue, and at a time individually set with the teacher.



A quick history of Tunisia

The Tunisian Republic, bordering the Mediterranean Sea between Libya and Algeria, has been founded by Habib Bourguiba in 1956 after successfully ending 75 years of French protectorate in a peaceful struggle for independence. Prior to that, Tunisia was part of the Ottoman Empire and, even earlier, a regional superpower called Carthago. While Carthago was narrowly beaten by the Roman Empire and then became a part of it, Tunisians are very proud of their important ancestors. And every child knows the story of Hannibal Barkas crossing the Alps with his elephants!




The flag symbolizes both Islam and Tunisian's history under the Ottoman Empire, and its colors stand for the fight against oppression (red) and peace (white).

The Islamic calendar counts the years since the Hijra, Muhammad's emigration to Medina, happened - in Latin "Anno Hegirae". This year began on 3rd of October and will end on 21st of September 2017!

05 HOW TO GET TO TUNISIA

Visa requirements

You will enter Tunisia with an entry visa, which enables you to enter and stay in the Tunisian territory up to 90 days. Tunisian embassies and consular missions abroad issue these visa.

The following passport holders will get a 90-day visa issued at the airport: Algeria, Andorra, Antigua, Argentina, Austria, Bahrain, Barbados, Belgium, Bermuda, Bosnia and Herzegovina, Brazil, Brunei, Bulgaria, Canada, Chile, Croatia, Denmark, Dominica, Fiji, Finland, France, Gambia, Germany, Greece, Guinea, Honduras, Hong Kong, Hungary, Iceland, Ireland, Italy, Ivory Coast, Japan, Kiribati, Libya, Liechtenstein, Luxembourg, Macedonia, Malaysia, Maldives, Mali, Malta, Mauritius, Morocco, Mauritania, Monaco, The Netherlands, Niger, Norway, Oman, Portugal, Qatar,

Romania, Saint Kitts and Nevis, Saint Lucia, Senegal, Serbia, Seychelles, Slovenia, Spain, Solomon Islands, South Korea, Sweden, Switzerland, Turkey, United Kingdom, United States of America, Vatican.

Of course, we at arabandu will help you with all visa-related questions at any time.
