Leo was just 27 pounds when he was rescued, he should have been 60. Sick, anemic and heartworm positive, Leo needed intensive veterinary care. At just two years of age, it is heartbreaking!

After weeks of antibiotics, multiple meals each day, and medicated baths for his skin condition, Leo now weighs almost 50 pounds and was finally healthy enough to be neutered. He was recently adopted by a family who loved his spirit.

Yes, that number is real! 15,000 Labs saved!



Thanks to your generosity and support, this month, Lab Rescue of the LRCP is celebrating two important milestones.

We are celebrating our 25th Anniversary and early in the New Year, we expect our 15,000th Lab saved.

This year marked another important milestone. **Lab Rescue of the LRCP has once again expanded our intake area to help more Labs in need. We are increasing our established shelter relationships from 60 shelters to more than 80.** The latest expansion includes high kill shelters in North Carolina and Ohio, as well, we have intensified our efforts in more areas of Pennsylvania. Lab Rescue will be there to take as many Labs as we can and find them new homes with our loving adopting families.

Leo's veterinary needs are not unique. Many of the Labs we rescue have multiple health challenges and 2016 is the third year in a row that the cost of veterinary care has grown because of the needs of those we rescue. The incidence of heartworm is increasing, skin conditions like flea dermatitis and non-contagious mange are on the rise, in addition to a variety of flea, mosquito and tick borne diseases. Many have not received even basic veterinary care.

Another example of how we're called on to save lives is Roscoe, whose severe neglect nearly ended his life.

Local animal control officers received a call about a dog lying in the middle of the road. It was Roscoe. He had been hit by a car. His family couldn't afford the extensive medical care that he needed and left him, injured, outside.

By the time he got help he was almost dead from an infection in his injured leg. No wound cleaning. No antibiotics. No love, care or shelter. Roscoe almost died.

Today, though we could not save his leg, Roscoe is enjoying his first holiday with a loving family. Roscoe has been adopted!


