The use of implant supported single tooth and partial edentulous restorations in the anterior and posterior zone covers a wide variety of clinical situations. Provisional replacement of teeth and the high expectations of esthetics and function create daily challenges in our practices. Immediate and early loading protocols and management options will be explored as well.

The emergence of high performance ceramic materials is providing a new set of options to restorative dentists. A detailed analysis of restorative material options will be discussed.

The treatment planning and clinical processes used to create successful outcomes will be presented along with the workflow technologies as they relate to successful long term performance of implant therapy in daily clinical practice.

This program will be a combination of a morning hands-on program devoted to Esthetic Tooth Preparations, and an afternoon treatment planning session with four selected case presentations with group discussion and case planning by each group provided with casts, radiographs and patient history. Emphasis will be placed on esthetic and interdisciplinary treatment, comprehensive rehabilitations, all-ceramic crowns and veneer techniques.

Topics to be covered include:

- Current Practice: Best practical techniques for porcelain veneers and all-ceramic crowns. Focus will be on tooth preparations, provisionals, adhesion and cement selection for lithium disilicate and zirconia restorations.
- Four cases for treatment planning. Guided questions/problem-driven treatment planning scenarios followed with solutions and learned lessons with implants, rehabilitation cases, determination of VDO, management of parafunction, and treatment sequencing.
- Material selection for full coverage restorations for anterior and posterior arches. Decision-making, comparison of various all-ceramic options and their selection in rehabilitation cases.

As dentists it is our responsibility to make beautiful teeth a part of a comprehensive plan that will create a completely healthy mouth. This involves the diagnosis and elimination of any functional or biologic disease process. While there are many aspects to this, one key is understanding how the anterior teeth fit into their functional matrix. Changing the size and shape of the anterior teeth has major functional consequences. Violating key biologic and functional principles will lead to eventual failure.
