



As much as I love Kubrick, I don't think this is a great poster. But it's included because I like the graphic possibilities of the Saul Bass approach that doesn't rely on actors' faces to sell the film. Plus BARRY LYNDON does have similar themes to our movie (poor kid aspiring to a life of opulence) for whatever that's worth.



What I like about this key art from a very comparable film, is that it expresses the posture of how teens hang out. And it's simple.







Something like this might work. Although it's too warm. I'd rather go with urgent and edgy. And the background image should convey "Hamptons," and suggest their differences. I think the repeated tagline works well here, and worked great for the TAKEN poster, but it's played out now so we can't use that.
